Course Title : Comics and Visual Culture

Instructor-in-Charge : Anhiti Patnaik

Course Description:

A historical and cultural examination of popular visual culture; case studies from comic books, manga, graphic novels, memes, and caricatures; transnational approach spanning India, Japan, and America; visual methodologies; critical theory on culture industry, political satire, patriarchy, and public morality; intersections of class, caste, gender, and racial violence in visual media.

Course Objectives:

- 1. Interpret comic books and graphic novels using visual methodologies.
- 2. Distinguish between genres and types of graphic storytelling.
- 3. Learn how popular culture and public morality are produced by popular media.
- 4. Evaluate critical theories of ideology, class, caste, race, and gender politics.

Learning Outcomes:

On the successful completion of the course and its requirements, students will be well-versed in visual methodologies, Critical Theory, and contemporary debates on mass culture and ideology with respect to class, caste, race, and gender politics.
